You don't need any prior knowledge of the area as all clues are solved by observation and the educational school treasure hunt packs contain all the necessary elements you need to have a great day out including maps, clues and answer sheet.

We would recommend a hunt will take a minimum of two hours to complete depending on the size of groups and ages of the children.

We encourage teachers/adults to stop at the point where the clues are solved and study the information, discussing it further with the children, looking out for further points of interest along the route which can be discussed also.

Parts of the National Curriculum are covered in the hunts including elements of Geography, History, and English at Key Stages 1 and 2. The hunts are also in line with the Learning outside the Classroom Manifesto.

Tupgill Park The Forbidden Corner is situated in Tupgill Park and is well worth a visit in its own right. See the Red Deer in our Deer Park, visit the fascinating Fish Temple, enjoy our Herb Garden.

Our History The brainchild of Mr C.R.Armstrong O.B.E, the Forbidden Corner was originally built as a private folly but due to public demand was subsequently opened to the public. The result is a unique labyrinth of Tunnels, Chambers, Follies and surprises created in a four acre garden in the heart of the Yorkshire Dales.

Schools & Educational Visits Opening times are Monday – Friday 12 noon until 6 pm. The educational rate is £5.00 each for children, teachers and helpers and is only available during term time. Outside term time the prices are £8.00 for Adults and £7.00 for children. Children must always be supervised with a ratio of one adult to a maximum of six children In order to save you time on your visit you may arrive at 11.30am on the park in order to have picnics etc and go in to the gardens at 12 noon.

FAQ's

What age range does The Forbidden Corner suit?

The Forbidden Corner is suitable for all age ranges, from children to adults.

How long does a visit usually last?

A visit to The forbidden Corner usually takes about 2 hours but people normally will spend a lot longer, you may go in and out of the gardens as many times as you like, but visitors must vacate the gardens before closing at 6pm

Do you have a picnic area and is it seated or grass areas?

We do have a picnic area, which has both seated and grass areas

Do you have toilet facilities and are they disabled accessible?

We have toilet facilities adjacent to the car and coach parking bays, which are disabled accessible, also at the café entrance.
